The Lesson from the Epistle of blessed Paul the Apostle to the Corinthians. II Cor. 11, 19–12, 9 RETHREN: Ye suffer fools gladly, seeing ye yourselves are wise. For ye suffer if a man bring you Dinto bondage, if a man devour you, if a man take of you, if a man exalt himself, if a man smite you on the face. I speak as concerning reproach, as though we had been weak. Howbeit, whereinsoever any is bold, (I speak foolishly,) I am bold also: Are they Hebrews? so am I: Are they Israelites? so am I: Are they the seed of Abraham? so am I: Are they ministers of Christ? (I speak as a fool), I am more: in labours more abundant, in stripes above measure, in prisons more frequent, in deaths oft. Of the Jews five times received I forty stripes save one. Thrice was I beaten with rods, once was I stoned, thrice I suffered ship-wreck, a night and a day I have been in the deep: in journeyings often, in perils of waters, in perils of robbers, in perils by mine own countrymen, in perils by the heathen, in perils in the city, in perils in the wilderness, in perils in the sea, in perils among false brethren: in weariness and painfulness, in watchings often, in hunger and thirst, in fastings often, in cold and nakedness: beside those things that are without, that which cometh upon me daily, the care of all the Churches. Who is weak, and I am not weak? who is offended, and I burn not? If I must needs glory: I will glory of the things which concern mine infirmities. The God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, which is blessed for evermore, knoweth that I lie not. In Damascus the governor under Aretas the king kept the city of the Damascenes with a garrison, desirous to apprehend me: and through a window in a basket was I let down by the wall, and escaped his hands. It is not expedient for me doubtless to glory, I will come to

visions and revelations of the Lord. I knew a man in Christ above fourteen years ago, (whether in the body, I cannot tell, or whether out of the body, I cannot tell, God knoweth:) such an one caught up to the third heaven. And I knew such a man, (whether in the body, or out of the body, I cannot tell, God knoweth:) how that he was caught up into paradise: and heard unspeakable words, which it is not lawful for a man to utter. Of such an one will I glory: yet of myself I will not glory, but in mine infirmities. For though I would desire to glory, I shall not be a fool: for I will say the truth: but now I forbear, lest any man should think of me above that which he seeth me to be, or that he heareth of me. And lest I should be exalted above measure through the abundance of the revelations, there was given to me a thorn in the flesh, the messenger of Satan to buffet me. For this thing I besought the Lord thrice, that it might depart from me: and he said unto me: My grace is sufficient for thee: for my strength is made perfect in weakness. Most gladly therefore will I rather glory in my infirmities, that the power of Christ may rest upon me. R. Thanks be to God.







Notes on the Music

Missa Che fa oggi il mio sole

Gregorio Allegri (1582–1652)

After establishing himself in a successful career as a singer, composer, and choirmaster at several Italian cathedrals and chapels, Gregorio Allegri was appointed to the Sistine Chapel choir as a contralto at the age of 47. He spent the rest of his life in the service of the Vatican, composing five masses as well as numerous motets including his famous Miserere mei, Deus. In a technique known as parody, Allegri chose an existing musical work as the basis for this mass. It was a madrigal by the master composer Luca Marenzio, who had died in 1599. He had achieved international fame working for a series of princely patrons both as a lutenist and a composer, setting various secular texts to music with unmatched creativity and skill. The text of this madrigal is a brief poem that begins by asking "What is my sun (=my love) doing today?" before exhorting the poet's voice and instrument to get busy praising her. In each movement of his mass, Allegri combines Marenzio's melodies, harmonies, and rhythmic gestures in different ways to create a coherent and pleasing shape.

Ave verum corpus

Orlandus Lassus (1520–1594)

A 14th-century manuscript attributes the text of this salutation to Pope Innocent VI, who died in 1362. In the 17th century, it is mentioned as a private devotion at the elevation of the Host. In his setting, Lassus reflects the nuances of the words, even incorporating a brief cascading ornament at the word "wave." The musical structure reflects the architecture of the poem, with each line individually set. The direct emotional final plea is underlined by intimate, expressive harmonies.
